

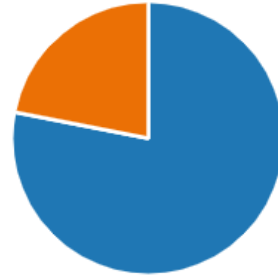

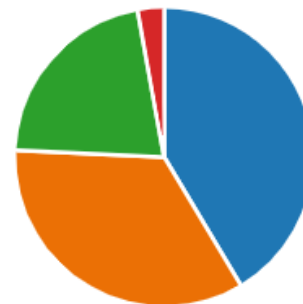

We are extremely mindful, at Saltersgate Junior School, that all children are different and diverse. Our topics in Jigsaw cover life experiences, different cultures, race, disabilities and family life. This is in topics such as Being Me in My World, Celebrating Difference and Relationships. We will be sending home the Jigsaw Knowledge Organisers for parents to find out more of our PSHE curriculum. Our RESPECT Values and British Values are at the heart of our school ethos and we have regular assemblies to instil this in our pupils.

First Aid is taught during the Healthy Me topic in Spring 2. We also have extra Practical First Aid sessions with the British Red Cross for years 5 and 6.</p>

The material should still be covered but it's how school and home then work together to ensure support is in place for her.</p>	<p>At Saltersgate Junior School, we ensure topics, that may be of a sensitive nature, are always covered with empathy and compassion. If a parent or carer has any concerns regarding sensitive material, please contact your child's teacher or Mrs Thomas (PSHE Lead).</p>
<p>I have attended the presentation but one thing that concerns me as a mum to older boys as well is contraception and there seems to be a lack of education particularly in secondary school, which I know you can't control but to what extent this is discussed in years 5 & 6? Another subject I talk about with mine is consent and what that actually means both for them and the person they are with. My older boys have said this isn't talked about in school</p>	<p>Consent is covered in all years, through behaviour lessons with Mr Vernon, our school Behaviour Support Officer, and teacher led activities. This is also covered through our Jigsaw scheme of learning in the Relationship topic in the Summer 1 term. Contraception is taught in secondary school in PSHE lessons.</p>

I would not like my child to be taught about being gender neutral or about being transgender.	This is all part of the PSHE statutory curriculum that we have to teach children about and is all part of growing up in an inclusive and diverse society. This taught in an age-appropriate way in the Relationships topic in term summer 1.
It's always helpful to know when family structures or early life is covered	Family dynamics are covered in the Relationships topic in summer 1. Early life is taught in science lessons and during the Changing Me topic in summer 2.
No, I do feel confident to discuss sex and relationships with my daughter but I don't think she is ready yet! It isn't something I feel she needs to be fully aware of just yet!	The DfE recommends that all primary schools should have a sex education programme tailored to the age and physical and emotional maturity of the pupils, drawing on knowledge of the human life cycle set out in National Curriculum Science - how a baby is conceived and born. Children are taught in an age-appropriate way by their class teacher.
Was invited to a meeting when son was in year 3 to run through what is covered in sex education. Very little notice was given so unable to attend. Told notes we're going to be issued and never received anything. If you felt important enough to hold a meeting you should have ensured parents who couldn't attend had the relevant information. Disappointing that working parents are never taken into consideration when arranging such meetings.	We will be holding a further meeting later in the year to discuss RSE. This will be held in April time before the Changing Me topic starts in Jigsaw.
It would be nice if the information in meetings were to be available in other ways. I haven't been able to attend the meetings about RSE due to work commitments and had asked for information to be sent out but it never was. I trust that school is teaching to an appropriate level, however, it would be nice to know what is being taught for when discussions arise at home.	We will be holding a further meeting later in the year to discuss RSE. If parents are wanting to attend but have work commitments, further meetings or drop-in sessions will be available. Knowledge organisers will be available to all parents.
